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Clinton Begins Asia Trip Amid N Korea Threat

TOKYO - US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton began a one-week Asia visit by praising the US-Japan alliance and saying the US and Asia needed to work together on the global financial crisis and climate change.

Kicking off her first trip as secretary of state, Clinton called the US-Japan alliance "vitally important" as she landed in Tokyo after weeks of bellicose North Korean rhetoric and reports it is preparing for a long-range missile test.

Searching for a way to end Pyongyang's nuclear program is likely to be one of the main topics on Clinton's trip, which also takes her to Indonesia, South Korea and China

"I have come to Asia as my first trip as secretary of state to convey that America's relationships across the Pacific are indispensable to addressing the challenges and seizing the opportunities of the 21st century," she said at an airport arrival ceremony.

In a series of interviews last week, friends and neighbors recalled Duch as strict, but fair, friendly, but a loner, an intellectual, and also a Christian evangelist.

Duch's long-delayed trial begins today, with the 66-year-old accused by the Extraordinary Chambers in the Courts of Cambodia of overseeing the deaths of more than 12,000 prisoners who passed through the S21 detention and torture facility. Chavez Decisively Wins Bid To End Term Limits

CARACAS, Venezuela - Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez handily won a referendum Sunday that will end presidential term limits, allowing him to run for re-election indefinitely and injecting fresh vibrancy into his socialist-inspired revolution.

The results, coming after voters had rejected a similar effort by Chavez just 15 months ago, pointed to his resilience after a decade in power, as well as to the fragmentation of his opposition, which as recently as November had won key mayoralties and governorships.

The vote opens the way not only for Chavez to run for a new six-year term when his current one expires in 2013, but could also bolster his ambitious agenda as an icon of the left and a counterweight to US policies in Latin America.

It also creates a new foreign policy challenge for the administration of US President Barack Obama, strengthening a leader who has made a career of taunting and deriding the US, even though Chavez just this weekend seemed to open the door for a different relationship.

At the risk of polarizing Venezuela's deeply divided society further, the victory could also strengthen

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
